ADOPTIONS – During the first quarter, we found homes for 13 adults, 25 teens (kittens between five months and one year old) and 6 kittens.

We started out the new year with a big celebration when our beautiful girl **Kashi** found her forever home after being a kindred kitty since 2008!! Being a shy girl, she didn't bring a lot of attention to herself – stayed in what we at the Adoption Center have dubbed "the shy corner", but her new family saw something very special in her. Now, after a period of hiding under the bed and peeking out to get the petting she so craved, she has come out of her shell and is making herself a part of their daily routine. And she is definitely calling attention to herself now – talking to them in meows, following them around, loving being brushed, and dashing around the house at night (luckily she lives with a night owl.) It is so important to us that we make good matches for our cats, particularly when it is one who has been with us a long time. We learn their quirks and their habits, and learn just what will be best for them. We had both a cheer and a tear when we sent her on her way!





Three very special cats came to reside at the Adoption Center in December of 2014. One of our devoted volunteers, Jeanne Greninger, passed away, so her three kindred kitties Solveig (formerly Mama Zoey), Flip and Flop came to stay with us. All had a bit of a struggle adjusting back to shelter life, they hung out together in our back room, shying away from the public. Jeanne had adopted Solveig a number of years before and then fostered the very shy Flip and Flop (and ultimately adopted them as well). We are so excited to report that **Flop** was adopted in February, followed by **Flip** in March and each is doing awesome in their new home. *Mama Zoey is still at the Adoption Center waiting for her new forever home. (Zoey is the kitty on the far right in the picture.)*

<u>Foster Care</u> – As of the end of March, we had 73 cats in our care: 21 at the Adoption Center, 34 in foster homes and 18 who are considered "permanent" fosters due to special needs. **PLEASE!! Our forever ongoing appeal still stands – we are desperate for good foster homes –- particularly for adoptable and special-needs adults!!!**

Spay/Neuter – We are facilitating a significant number of spays and neuters through our low-cost programs. Through March, we have altered 148 cats – of those 22 were kindred kitties, 94 were owned cats and the remainder (21%) were feral/neighborhood cats. And where we were unable to help in some areas, we successfully referred individuals to other alternative programs to ensure that we maximized spay/neuters in general. We can't say enough about what an impact the spaying and neutering of cats makes in our communities! We are proud of our efforts and will continue to expand those efforts during the coming year. **You can help us to continue the trend and "Sponsor A Spay For Mother's Day" – see Page 3!**

RESCUES -- Cats come to us from so many different directions, for a variety of reasons, and often times with unexpected challenges. We have some wonderful cats right now whose stories (and in some cases their very lives) have been solely dependent on the generosity our loyal supporters, and the loving care given by our dedicated foster families.

Minnie – This little girl was rescued in fall 2013 from a farm. When she came to stay at the Adoption Center, she was extremely shy and under-nourished. She seemed to thrive for a while, but she went from a kitty who purred loudly with any attention she she got, to one who was quiet and withdrawn. Initial vet visits didn't uncover what her issue might be so she was moved to a foster home. Because of the tenacity of Minnie's loving foster mom, Shirley, who knew something was just not right, the vet finally identified her problem. Minnie has a mouth condition called feline oral resorptive lesions. It was necessary to do dental work and remove six teeth. These lesions are excruciatingly painful and we are just amazed at the resiliency Minnie exhibited through all of this. Thankfully, she is now back to her loving, sweet self again!! It is likely that the reabsorption issue will recur and she will need to have regular vet visits to keep it in check, which her devoted new mom, Elizabeth, is very willing to

do! We are so happy that she is now adopted and will be lovingly watched



over for the rest of her life!!

Joey – Early in spring, an emaciated and sickly little orange cat was found wandering outside in Trevor. After several weeks of foster care, he came to the Adoption Center. His looks certainly fooled us. He has such a grumpy cat expression, but he was just the opposite — he was laid back and loved EVERYONE! In early April, he spiked a fever and quickly became dehydrated and lethargic. We felt it was necessary to take him to Animal Emergency, where he was monitored for nearly a week while on IV fluids and antibiotics. A battery of tests were run to determine the cause of diarrhea and a very mysterious fluctuation of his body temp. Additional diagnostics were needed so he was moved into the Intensive Care Unit in Pewaukee where he had ultrasound testing and also additional fecal panels.

It was finally determined that Joey had lungworm which is pretty uncommon and can cause fluctuations in temperature and keeping him from gaining weight! So the lungworm was treated and Joey was finally released from the hospital. He is now in a loving foster home, but his medical woes have not yet ended. He ended up with necrosis of his tail and had to have half of his tail amputated and he continues to deal with inflammatory bowel syndrome (IBS) which is now being treated with special food and a myriad of medicines which he takes like a champ. Through ALL of this, he has never stopped purring and begging for attention. He has now gained almost a pound, but will continue to need special care (IBS is TOUGH to treat). We'll continue to report about him on our Facebook page and are appealing to those who are able to contribute to his continuing care! Oh for the love of cats!!!!!



<u>Blue</u> – Blue is a 2-3 year old white kitty that was rescued from a Milwaukee neighborhood in March 2015. But you wouldn't have known just what he looked like when he taken in. We were called with heartbreaking news that someone had hurt a stray cat by spray painting him blue and shaving him. It was 5° outside and the cat was hiding of course, because he had no fur! The volunteers who are now fostering Blue were able to catch him and got him in and warmed up. Blue was scared, had scratches on his body, and had blue and green dye in his hair. He was really dirty and afraid of people. We got him the medical care he needed, vaccinated, neutered and microchipped him. Blue's foster mom and dad are giving him lots of love and he is much happier. In fact, they believe he will be ready for adoption soon. He purrs a lot, and is beginning to learn how to play with cat toys. He craves human attention and loves sitting with people and having his soft fur stroked—so far the record is 20 minutes! Blue sometime flinches a bit when too many people are around and would probably do best in a quiet home, but for right now we (and he) are just happy that he is safe, warm and well cared for (and much whiter of course).
