Cat Stats

Rescues / Surrenders

In the first quarter of the year, we rescued 57 cats and kittens. Of that number, 36 were surrendered pets, 15 were unowned cats, and 6 were born to rescued pregnant cats.

Adoptions

We also re-homed 65 kitties (27 adults, 19 teens and 19 kittens)—20 more than last year!

Spay / Neuter

We facilitated 127 spay/neuters in the first quarter and with just 10% being TNR (trap-neuter-release). It has been a difficult year for TNR due to a shortage of low-cost alternatives for this important service. We continue to look for new options to assist individuals who are working in their neighborhoods to manage their outdoor cat population.

Foster Care

We have slightly more cats in foster than we had last year –particularly adult cats. PLEASE spread the word that Kindred Kitties continues to be in need of committed foster homes. 




One cat can have up to 3 litters of kittens a year. Each litter can have as many as 6-7 kittens.

Did you know?

Earlier this year, one of our adopted kittens, Mindy (now Dahlia) was experiencing pain on being touched. Vet examination and further diagnostics revealed that the kitten had rickets. Rickets is a disease caused by a Vitamin D deficiency and is characterized by imperfect calcification, softening and distortion of the bones, which can lead to delayed growth and lameness. In cats, it is most likely caused by an inherited Vitamin D Receptor Defect.

Talking with the foster mom of this kitten, we learned that two of the other three kittens in that litter had exhibited some symptoms that were also suspicious, so we contacted the other adopters and learned that their kittens, while not showing signs of pain, were very quiet and inactive. Our vet conducted specialty blood tests and X-rays and determined that Dahlia's siblings—Morton and Miles (now Winston)—also had rickets. There are two types of rickets: VDDR1 Vitamin D Dependent Rickets is caused by a deficiency in an enzyme that produces the active form of Vitamin D and VDDR2 Vitamin D Resistant Rickets (which is far more rare and harder to treat). Our kittens were diagnosed with VDDR1.

The treatment for rickets is a medication called Calcitriol (an active form of Vitamin D) which is given daily. They will need to stay on the medication until they reach skeletal maturity (usually 12 months of age). The kittens are weighed regularly to ensure they are growing. They have periodic vet exams which include X-rays to check bone growth and bloodwork to determine calcium levels. Their bones will continue to remodel and improve with time. They will have chronic limb deformities (whatever they had when they began treatment will remain the same) but should live an otherwise normal life.

It will be about a year before the treatment is complete, but we are so happy to report that the treatments are working and these kitties are making good progress. Thanks to a foster mom, Barb, who always gets to know her kittens well enough to spot when something isn't "just right;" thanks to the Dr. Alison at Harris Pet Hospital for her diligent research and great communication in treating these kitties; and thanks to three wonderful adopters for their loving care!!



DAHLIA (Formerly Mindy)

She's a tiny, super sweet girl. She loved to sit on laps and purr. When not sitting on a lap, she always felt secure laying in a cozy cat bed. She didn't move around much, and when she did, she didn't go very far and walked gingerly—almost looked like a waddle. The vet determined she was in quite a bit of pain and that the rickets affected her growth significantly. Fortunately, she liked to eat and meowed loudly if the food wasn't dished quickly enough. She was really good at taking her Calcitriol Supplement right away, but was not too fond of the Gabapentin (for pain); she learned to spit it out if not given just right.

Dahlia has shown significant improvement in her mobility and energy level, especially since the increase in dosage of Calcitriol last month. She is running around and playing like a normal cat. She is still very cautious and does not jump down from any height, but she really enjoys using stairs to get on and off the bed/couch.

WINSTON (Formerly Miles)

Winston began his adopted life as an active, normal kitten, but that quickly changed. He became less active and was suddenly content just to stay curled up on a lap. He also was no longer gaining weight. A vet examination revealed that while he was in no pain, he did have rickets. As it turned out, in addition to rickets, Winston had other challenges.

In February, Winston became extremely constipated and was admitted to a specialty hospital for a 72- hour stay. Being such a little guy, the medical team was not optimistic. A series of X-rays revealed that he had somehow fractured his pelvis when he was just a baby. That fracture did not heal properly and, as a result, his pelvis is narrowed. Thankfully, the team was able to relieve the constipation, and came up with a care plan to prevent future complications.

While he still can't jump or run like a normal cat, he can totally keep up with his two kitty siblings. His caregivers have set up ramps around the house so he can access couches and his favorite bed. He spends his days playing with toys, and enjoys perching on the back of the couch and watching the birds outside. He's made great progress!




MORTON

Morton & Molly were adopted together. While she was extremely active, Morton didn't play at all. He was content laying in whatever bed they'd put him, and just watching her. He barely ever walked around, but there was no evidence that he was in any pain. He loved attention and seemed quite content—purred all the time. While his appetite was always good, he was slow to gain weight. Upon examination, only Morton was diagnosed with rickets; Molly was not affected by the disease.

His foster mom says he's been a pleasure to give meds to which makes the process a whole lot easier! As of late April, the difference the Calcitriol has made is amazing. He's now very active, and can climb up and down furniture. He plays with toys! It's been an unbelievable transformation!


