Rescues / Surrenders

In the first quarter this year, we've taken in 54 cats-20 adults, 15 teens, 14 kittens, and 5 were born to a pregnant mom we rescued. Over half of the cats we took in were owned cats that individuals surrendered, and the remainder were rescued from neighborhoods.

Spay / Neuter

Our spay/neuter activity increased by about 10% over last year. We were able to facilitate the spay/neuter of 45 cats in the January through March period. And, as in the past, where we were unable to help in some areas, we were successful in referring many individuals to alternative programs to ensure that we maximized spaying and neutering in general.

Adoptions

We are pleased to say that we exceeded our 2024 adoption rate for the first quarter and re-homed 72 kitties (24 adults, 29 teens and 19 kittens). The number of adults adopted is evidence of the difference the Adoption Center makes in increasing the visibility of our older adult cats and finding them their forever homes!



Fosters Needed

At the end of March, we had 86 cats in foster care. This number is mounting at the time of the writing of this newsletter, as we are entering the spring kitten season. Every year, we receive hundreds of calls and emails from one place or another, and we know we can't help them all. But the number of cats that we are able to rescue is totally dependent on the amount of foster space we have available to house them. 5 Benefits of Fostering

1. Fostering provides a safe and healthy environment for animals who need to heal, grow or get some extra TLC while looking for homes.

Whether you're fostering tiny kittens or adult cats, many of these animals require your love and support

to have the best chance of finding an adopter. When you foster, you help give them the space, experiences and resources they need when going to a new home!



2. Fostering animals creates more space in shelters for other animals in need.

Each and every animal in a shelter requires time and resources that could be stretched further if those animals were in foster homes, regardless of if the shelter is crowded or not. Foster caregivers help the shelters and rescues immeasurably!



3. Fostering saves the lives of neonate and pee wee kittens.

Neonatal (zero to four weeks) and Pee-Wee (four to eight weeks) kittens are considered an extremely vulnerable population as they often cannot survive without round-the-clock care. Having a foster caregiver with the supplies and training they need to care for these tiny kittens



can literally save their lives and help them become healthy, strong and ready for adoption!

4. Fostering introduces the cat or kitten to new pools of prospective adopters.

Fostered cats and kittens benefit greatly from exposure to their caregiver's friends and family, and their caregiver can offer trusted assessments of the cat's personality and needs. Not only is the foster caregiver the cats' parent, but their publicist, too!



5. Your life becomes a whole lot more interesting—and adorable!

Who wouldn't want adorable cats and kittens around? Think of all the benefits: the companionship, the chance for a new routine and best of all, the potential for the cutest snuggles ever! Fostering is easy to weave into your everyday life and the shelter will provide you with everything you need.






Did you?

Just 1 un-spayed female cat, her mate, and all of their offspring, producing just two litters per year, with 2 surviving kittens per litter can result in:





While kittens are undeniably cute, they require a lot of time, training, and energy. If you're looking for a more relaxed, low-maintenance companion, an adult cat might be the perfect fit. Consider giving an adult cat a second chance—you might just find your perfect match!

Cat Obesity

In the past month, we have taken in several extremely overweight kitties, which has prompted us take the time to do a bit of research on the subject. Surveys over the last couple of decades have revealed that overweight cats have become increasingly common in the United



States, with estimates suggesting that up to 63% of cats are overweight or obese.

While the optimal weight of a cat depends on its breed and health history, the average domestic feline should ideally weigh between 8 and 10 pounds. Weight gain is most likely to develop between the ages of 2 and 10 years old, when cats use less energy. Cats are considered to be overweight when they reach 9 to 20% above their ideal body weight—meaning a cat that weighs just 0.72 to 2 pounds heavier than average could be considered overweight. Obesity would be 20-30% above ideal body weight.



If you don't own a scale, but you want to know if your cat is overweight, there are several signs of cat obesity that may suggest your pet is heavier than it should be:

- · Lying down or sitting more than usual
- Disinterest in physical activity
- Difficulty climbing stairs or jumping
- Spine, ribs, or hip bones can't be felt
- No discernible waist
- Dirty or messy coat
- Less frequent bowel movements or constipation

Not surprisingly, the primary causes for overweight in cats are no different than humans!

- 1. Overeating & Poor Diet Increase Calorie Intake: excessive calorie intake, or consuming more calories than they burn; high-calorie diets (diets high in carbohydrates or processed foods); high-fat, sugary treats.
- 2. Lack of Exercise Reduces Calorie Expenditure: limited opportunities for physical activity; lack of playtime and exploration.

And the result can significantly impact both the cat's health and lifespan. Following are the health risks related to obesity in cats:

- Reduced lifespan: Obese cats can have significantly shorter lifespans than healthy cats, with some studies showing a 2.8-fold increased mortality rate in obese cats between 8 and 12 years old compared to their lean counterparts.
- Increased risk of diseases: Obesity can increase the risk of diabetes, heart disease, arthritis, respiratory issues, and certain cancers.
- Metabolic problems: Obesity can lead to metabolic deterioration and hormonal changes.
- Difficulty with anesthesia: Obese cats can be at higher risk during anesthesia and may require special care during procedures.
- Decreased activity and quality of life: Overweight cats may become less active, playful, and energetic, affecting their interaction with their families.
- Grooming issues: Obesity can make it difficult for cats to groom themselves, leading to poor hair coats and increased risk of skin problems.

What to do if your cat is overweight/obese:

- Consult your veterinarian: Develop a weight loss plan with your vet.
- Measure food portions: Control your cat's calorie intake by measuring food portions.
- Choose a healthy diet: Opt for a high-protein, low-carb food.
- Encourage exercise: Engage your cat in interactive play and consider walks on a leash.
- Limit or eliminate treats: Reduce or eliminate treats to help with weight loss.
- Gradual weight loss: Avoid rapid weight loss, as it can cause fatty liver disease. A gradual approach over time is recommended.
- Monitor progress: Track your cat's weight loss and adjust the plan as needed.

It's really easy for a cat to gradually gain weight and for caregivers not to notice, which is just another good reason why it's so important to schedule those annual preventative exams with your vet. It's a great way to track both weight gain or loss, and oversee the general well being of your cat.


